ESTUARY WALK WITH NIGEL MORTIMER

FVCA are delighted to report that a pre-Covid idea came to fruition on 23 September when Nigel Mortimer, AONB Marine Ecologist and long-time fan of Frogmore Creek, ran an informative walk-and-talk for a cheerful group of 24 Frogmorians (and 8 dogs!) along the north bank of the Creek. Nigel was able to tell us about the estuary (and yes, it can be called an estuary as well as a ria) at many levels; its importance as a salty habitat, its natural mudflats and reedbeds, the richness of the diatom soup that forms the base of the food chain nourishing inhabitants (worms, fish, wading and fishing birds) and visitors (migratory birds, seals and otters) alike. We could (and did) ask anything we liked – we touched on invasive species including Pacific Oysters, types of seagrass preferred by sea horses, whether dredging upsets the flora and fauna (yes but not for long), what Mermaid's tresses are, how to recognise the kingfisher's flight pattern..... We learned when it is safe to eat oysters and mussels (above all watch out for that red tide!) and what types of jellyfish turn up in our creek. As we turned for home, I could picture herds of limpets grazing against a multicoloured backdrop of peacock worm tentacles (though sadly, Frogmore's are paler than elsewhere as they bleach in the sun!)

If you are interested in a repeat of this in the Spring do let a member of the committee know and we will spend winter twisting Nigel's arm! We have also had a suggestion for a land focused walk-and-talk covering plants and animals along the creek – if you like this idea, please let us know and we will try to organise it.

NATURE NOTES by Amanda Starkey

The late start to summer this year has had an unexpected side effect. The diversity of butterflies and moths in our gardens has been wonderful. I have seen marbled white butterflies, small tortoiseshells, fritillaries, red admirals, orange tips and of course very many cabbage whites and small whites. I have also been lucky enough to spot on my car after a rain shower, a beautiful emerald moth drying its wings. A pair of scarlet tiger moths visited again this year. There has been the odd sighting of my favourite, the beautiful and special hummingbird hawk moth. Difficult to photograph as it does not land but hovers above the flowers which provide its nectar, staying very briefly as it unfurls its long proboscis to feed, then darting off again. It will, interestingly, return to the same food source on subsequent days. My neighbour, Nigel, photographed a small copper butterfly in his recently established wildlife meadow. Now, with fallen apples from the cooking apple tree, red admiral butterflies are feeding on them as they ferment.
